Summer Schedule - DCGS Library / FHC hours remain the same for now. We are open Tuesdays during the day from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and in the evening 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.; Thursday morning from 9 a.m. to noon and in the evening 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. However, this schedule is subject to change, since the library is run by volunteers whose schedules can change suddenly.

DCGS meeting, Tue 21 Mar 2006

“What Can You Do With a Scanner?”

Bernie Rudberg discussed what a scanner is and how it works; types of scanners; and things you can do with scanned image files (display them on your computer screen; print them; make copies; and transmit them). He demonstrated various ways that genealogists can use scanners in their research, and discussed software packages that can help. He also discussed working with images from digital cameras. Digital image files open possibilities. The only limit is your imagination!

Mr. Rudberg is retired, after having spent four years in Navy electronics, and 35 years as an engineer with IBM. He is now actively involved in railroad history and restoration, and is using computers and digital imaging to preserve railroad history.

DCGS Meeting, May 16, 2006

“Saving the Homestead of Revolutionary War Major Abraham Fort!”

presented by Virginia Buechele and Judy Wolf.

Ginny Buechele and Judy Wolf presented an interesting program on their early steps to preserve a home that could be one of the oldest remaining structures in the town of Poughkeepsie, hailing back to the Fort family who were active in the Revolutionary War. Ms. Buechele and Ms. Wolf are co-presidents of the Fort Homestead Association. They described the process of obtaining a charter from the Regents of the University of the State of New York to become a non-profit, tax-exempt association, a necessary first step before negotiating with the developer who still retains ownership of the house located at 2228 South Road.

This house is mentioned in Helen Wilkinson Reynolds' 1929 book, *Dutch Houses in the Hudson Valley before 1776*, on pages 344 and 412 (republished, Dover edition, 1965). [Ed.- The photo is copied from this book.] It is believed the house was built between about 1742 and 1760; the land was bought by the Fort family in 1759. IBM eventually acquired the land and it became part of a private golf course; Thomas Watson Sr. used the house when he was in Poughkeepsie. IBM has since sold the land to a residential home developer.



The Fort house was in the process of being prepared for demolition by the developer when the Town of Poughkeepsie Historic Preservation Commission obtained a stop order. By coincidence, Ms. Buechele and Ms. Wolf became aware of the house about the same time while they were helping a Girl Scout restore the Fort family cemetery, which is across Rt. 9 from the home. The homestead itself, although located right on busy Rt. 9, has in effect been hidden in plain sight, a 10-foot tall stockade fence guarding it from the heavy traffic.

The presenters set up a 3-part display of materials relating to their genealogical research on the Fort family, architectural aspects of the house itself, and the period

1911- 1944 when the homestead was owned by the Dickerson family and operated as a working farm.

Ginny and Judy have been very active in attempting to contact living descendants of the Fort family - a process that demands considerable skill since they are following mostly female lines of the daughters in the family. They are also searching out family papers and information about all of the families who have lived in the house.

The goals of the Fort Homestead Association are to obtain legal ownership of the house, have it listed on State and National Historical Registers, and restore and maintain the home as a living history education center. Website Changes Coming Soon!

It has been six years since the Dutchess County Genealogical Society's website first made its appearance. Then, my goal was to provide an internet presence for the Society and a supplementary means by which to communicate general organization information to people interested in Dutchess County genealogy. It provided information about our meeting topics and the hours of operation for our library. Since its beginning, the website has expanded far beyond that initial objective. It now includes a directory of the holders of vital records and the procedures for obtaining them from the various municipalities within the county; a listing of the Table of Contents of The Dutchess journal, beginning with the very first issue and continuing with each new one; and each new issue of "The Dutchess Newsletter" since the Winter, 2001 issue.

This short list is deceiving. The addition of each of these features has involved tremendous investment of time and effort, followed by demand for additional resources so that they can be kept current. The job of simply maintaining and updating the site is one that has grown far beyond the initial scope and so we are making changes!

We have recently begun working with Computat Systems, Inc., a local website support company that will be responsible for making updates to our website at our direction in the coming year. We anticipate with this help, additional improvements to the site will be possible. Work has already begun on the first of these - to redesign and

streamline our entire website. The work is well underway and you can expect to see the results in the coming month or two. Once this is accomplished we should be able to bring additional new features to the website that will be of value to many of our members.

I will continue to be actively involved in the website and decisions regarding it but I will no longer be physically making the changes to the website. Creating and developing this medium for communication amongst Dutchess County genealogists has been a very rewarding endeavor for me personally. I am extremely happy to see it grow beyond its initial scope and look forward to the expansion this move enables. I want to personally thank each and every member, volunteer and website viewer who has taken time to comment, encourage and assist - it has truly been a fun time!

Recent Updates include the addition of the Table of Contents of the Spring issue of The Dutchess and the Spring 2006 Newsletter, and the posting of meetings.

In addition to those items discussed above, the website includes an application for membership in the Dutchess County Genealogical Society and an order form for requesting individual back issues of The Dutchess. Both are available for printing.
