• **Library Report**

New books in the library include:

Even More Palatine Families. 18th Century Immigrants to the American Colonies and their German, Swiss and Austrian Origins. 3 volumes. By Henry Z Jones, Jr., FASC and Lewis Bunker Rohrbach, CG. Picton Press, 2002. 2381 pp. This set is a continuation of Hank Jones' earlier volumes on Palatine immigration to America. Volume 1 is about German immigrants to colonial New York in the 1717-1776 time frame, with names listed in alphabetical order. Volume 2, authored mostly by Rohrbach, consists of a study of the 1710 Swiss and German Settlers of New Bern, North Carolina, with transcribed records for Craven Precinct & County, as well as 2 additional chapters on Swiss migration from Zurich to America in the 1730's. Volume 3 has more miscellaneous materials and lists as well as the every name index for all 3 volumes. For Volume 3, although some of the lists have been previously published in some form, a concerted effort was made here to provide accurate transcripts of the original lists in their original order, including - 1709 Rotterdam Departure lists, lists of Palatines returned to Rotterdam, the Hunter Lists of New York, some corrections and additions to More Palatine Families, a few new passenger lists, etc.

The Burling Books. Ancestors and Descendants of Edward and Grace Burling, Quakers (1600-2000). By Jane Thompson-Stahr. 2 vol. Baltimore: Gateway Press, Inc, 2001. Including: Barnes, Bedell, Bowne, Brown, Carpenter, Cornell, Cruger, De Zeng, Dusenbury, Ferris, Field, Ford, Griffin, Gummere, Hallock, Haviland, Hunt, Ketcham, Kimble, Lawrence, Lowerre, Mott, Nelson, Norrington, Parsons, Pixley, Roesch, Rogers, Sampson, Scheffelin, Shotwell, Smith, Street, Thompson, Titus, Underhill, Vail, Vincent, Way, Weeks, White, Wood. Well-documented family history covering up to 16 generations including women's lines as much as possible. According to the author, there are 3211 identified descendants and about 10,000 persons mentioned in the books.
